




would have wanted." Ross passed away October 10th.

Vocational Training Team to Ghana Teacher Training Initiative

Rotary District 6400 is looking for individuals interested in applying for a position as a Team Leader or Team Member on a Teacher Training VTT to Rotary District 9102 in the Upper West Region of Ghana in May 2019. Rotary will cover the cost of travel and room and board for this trip.

The Vocational Training Team (VTT) is a Rotary Foundation program where teams of Rotarians and non-Rotarians travel overseas with a Rotarian leader to take part in a training project that fits one of the Foundation's Areas of Focus.. This year Governor Paul Sincock decided that education will be the focus. (Basic Education and Literacy)

Purpose:

To train primary education teachers in the Upper West Region of Ghana on techniques to increase student involvement in the classroom in classes grades 1 to 3.

Qualifications of VTT members:

- Teachers/ teacher trainers/ teacher educators with expertise in teacher training in primary education, specifically student involvement in classroom
- Employed with a minimum of 2 years of experience in education; recently retired.
- Previous International travel preferred
- Individuals who can work well on a team and are flexible.
- Individuals who can travel to Ghana in May 2019 for two weeks

Prior to departure the VTT will be required to participate in all orientation sessions and complete necessary travel requirements. During the trip, team members must accept the decisions of the Rotarian Team Leader, travel with the team on the schedules established, maintain standards of behavior that will reflect positively on Rotary, and share expertise and skills with host country participants. After the trip, the VTT must prepare and submit final reports, and speak about the experience to Rotary Clubs and other groups.



We are proud to report that District 6400 received four awards from The Rotary Foundation at the recent Zone 28-29 Institute in Erie, Pennsylvania. These awards were for Foundation accomplishments during the 2017-2018 Rotary year.

We were also very pleased to receive a letter from the Rotary Foundation Board of Trustees stating that the District 6400 grants program was 100% in compliance with reporting requirements as of the October 2018 world reporting analysis. We thank everyone who worked on grants at the Club and District level this past year for your continued effort. We recognize the hard work involved to maintain this level of compliance and deeply appreciate the good work that all of you are doing.

This year we received a District block grant in the amount of \$83,955 and awarded a total of 31 community and collaborative grants. Examples of projects included the development of a leadership Academy for Girls, purchasing a washer/dryer plus bedding for 50 homeless people, teaching students how to grow their own food and eat healthier, constructing a solar powered school bus shelter and restoring a school for the blind and providing 20 braille devices.

We currently have two global scholars who are working on graduate degrees. Andrea Bechard (RC of Windsor 1918) is studying at the Institut Barcelona d'Estudis Internacionals in Spain pursuing a masters degree in International Relations. Madison Vorva (RC of Plymouth) is studying at Cambridge University in England working on a masters degree in Environmental Policy. Each global scholar was awarded a \$30,000 grant by District 6400. We are pleased to announce that Gaia Klotz has been selected as a Peace Fellow for 2019. Gaia will be studying at the University of Bradford in the United Kingdom.



Dr. Nick Krayacich (RC of LaSalle Centennial) led a second Vocational Training Team to Ethiopia in August to conduct a training program for teachers that emphasized proper handwashing techniques. During this trip, the Howey Family Health Center was also dedicated (*at left*). The new medical facility which is located in Debre Berhan, Ethiopia will serve a minimum of 30,000 villagers per year and opened their doors to the community on September 3rd.

We are currently the primary partner in a total of fourteen (14) global grants. The projects associated with these grants are

located in India, England, Spain, Ethiopia, Italy, Canada and the United States. These projects are focusing on e-learning literacy in schools, microfinance, maternal and child health, water and sanitation, economic development, pediatric heart surgery and global scholars. The global grants for these 14 projects total \$1,097,957.

Congratulations to all the Rotarians and Rotary clubs that are actively participating in local and global community service projects. Through the Rotary Foundation and your hard work, we are truly "pursuing our dreams" and "inspiring others to do good" throughout the world.

The Young Rotary Leaders of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland hosted a debate October 17th, featuring four of the five candidates running in Ward 1. The sponsorship, which was covered by <u>CBC News</u> <u>Windsor</u>, demonstrated both civic engagement and Rotarians in action!

Interact president Lizzy Belinky chaired the meeting assisted by Rotarians Ashley McFadden and John Krimmel. Rotarian Krimmel noted that the Interact Club is the largest service club in the school. Update from Rotary Peace Fellow Laurie Smolenski, from Grosse Pointe: I'm currently the Development and Outreach Officer at the Institute for Economics and Peace (IEP), a global think tank that uses data to better understand and communicate the drivers of peace. There is a great story here – Rotary and IEP formalized a

partnership in 2017, the goal of which is to bring IEP's peace research and tools to 1.2 million Rotarian peacemakers around the world. I directly support this work, including speaking at Rotary events to promote the partnership and encourage Rotarians to take advantage of the resources that are being made available through our collaboration. I am also responsible for managing relationships with foundation and institutional supporters, disseminating IEP's research through diverse public channels, and advancing IEP's educational programming.

Going back further, I had first learned about IEP from a presentation at the 2016 Rotary Peace Fellow Seminar at the University of Queensland (UQ), and had actively followed the Institute since. (I'd taken some intro stats courses at UQ and



was very interested in marrying quantitative methods with my interests in peace and related social issues, so this research is squarely within my wheelhouse.)

Shortly after I returned to New York (where I live) from Australia, the position that I now have opened; the timing and the functions of this role were perfect. It's been a very meaningful "full circle" evolution, and I'm incredibly grateful for Rotary's role this process – I believe it was my training as a Peace Fellow, my exposure to the Institute through that Rotary seminar, and my longtime relationship with Rotary that positioned me for the job.

Jennifer Jones named Rotary Foundation Trustee

Rotary International President-Elect Mark Maloney announced in October the election of new Rotary Foundation trustees for 2019-2023, including Past R.I. President Ian Riseley and Super District 6400's Past R.I. Vice-President Jennifer Jones (pictured at right during a World Polio Day event last month in Melbourne, Australia. Congratulations Jennifer!

After 30 years of bold action, historic achievements, and sometimes discouraging setbacks, Rotary and its partners in the <u>Global Polio</u> <u>Eradication Initiative</u> (GPEI) have nearly brought polio to an end.

This groundbreaking public-private partnership and its innovative



strategies were celebrated Wednesday, October 24th, during Rotary's 6th annual World Polio Day event, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, at the <u>College of Physicians of Philadelphia</u>. Several District 6400 clubs held "livestream viewing parties"!

Hundreds of people attended in person, including representatives of all five GPEI partners, and thousands more worldwide watched it live online. Cable news journalists Ashleigh Banfield, host of HLN's "Crime and Justice," and Alex Witt, host of "MSNBC's "Weekends Live With Alex Witt," moderated the event.

Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair Ron Burton began the program by noting that Philadelphia is where Rotary announced, at its international convention in 1988, that it doubled its fundraising goal of \$120 million and raised \$247 million.

The moment showed Rotary's strength as an organization capable of tackling the challenge of ending the disease globally and spearheading one of the most ambitious public health initiatives in history, the GPEI. The other partners of the GPEI are the <u>World Health Organization</u>, <u>UNICEF</u>, <u>U.S. Centers for</u> <u>Disease Control and Prevention</u>, and the <u>Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation</u>.
