Rotary International President-elect Mark Daniel Maloney explained his vision for building a stronger Rotary, calling on leaders to expand connections to their communities and to embrace innovative membership models.

Maloney, a member of the Rotary Club of Decatur, Alabama, USA, unveiled the 2019-20 presidential theme, Rotary Connects the World, to incoming district governors at Rotary's annual training event, the International Assembly, in San Diego on January 14th. District 6400 Governor-Elect John Chambers and Sandy were there, along with their 528 classmates from around the globe.

"The first emphasis is to grow Rotary – to grow our service, to grow the impact of our projects, but most importantly, to grow our membership so that we can achieve more," Maloney said.

Maloney believes that connection is at the heart of the Rotary experience. " (Rotary) allows us to connect with each other, in deep and meaningful ways, across our differences," Maloney said. "It connects us to people we would never otherwise have met, who are more like us than we ever could have known. It connects us to our communities, to professional opportunities, and to the people who need our help."

Maloney also called on every Rotary and Rotaract club to identify segments of their community not represented in their club by creating a membership committee with diverse members.

"Through Rotary, we connect to the incredible diversity of humanity on a truly unique footing, forging deep and lasting ties in pursuit of a common goal," he added. "In this ever more divided world, Rotary connects us all."


February is Peace & Conflict Resolution Month

Conflict and violence displaced more than 68 million people in the past year, and half of those are children.

Rotarians refuse to accept conflict as a way of life. Rotary projects provide training that fosters understanding and provides communities with the skills to resolve conflicts. Through our service projects, peace fellowships, and scholarships, our members are taking action to address the underlying causes of conflict, including poverty, inequality, ethnic tension, lack of access to education, and unequal distribution of resources.

Rotary makes amazing things happen, like:

- ⇒ Improving quality of life. Rotary members founded the People for People Foundation, which has helped 10,000 families afford food, clothing, rent, utilities, medications, and other necessities.
- ⇒ Raising awareness of bullying. Rotaract clubs in the Philippines conduct antibullying campaigns in schools to teach children how to handle conflict peacefully from an early age.
- ⇒ Protecting domestic violence survivors and their families. The U.S. state of Louisiana has the fourth highest incidence of death caused by domestic violence. Local Rotary members met this issue by helping a shelter provide food, clothing, legal advocacy, and counseling to over 500 women in one year.
- ⇒ Promoting positive peace. Rotary has partnered with the Institute for Economics and Peace, an independent think tank and leader in the study of peace and conflict, to help address the root causes of conflict and create conditions that foster peace.



Peace & Conflict Resolution by the numbers:



- ⇒ 100 peace fellowships are offered each year at Rotary Peace Centers around the world
- ⇒ 65 million people are currently displaced by armed conflict or persecution
- ⇒ \$142 million has been raised by Rotary to support peace
- ⇒ 1,000+ students have graduated from Rotary's Peace Centers program

It is a sad time in Rotary District 6400. PDG John R. Mueller (Jack) passed away on Sunday, January 13th. Jack was a fixture in Dearborn Rotary and District 6400 for 50 years. He joined the club, working at Montgomery Wards in East Dearborn in 1968. That is where he met Jane, and they were married in 1991. Jack and Jane have both served the club as President, and Jack served District 6400 as District Governor in the 1991-92 Rotary Year. The Rotary International Theme that year for R.I. President Raja Saboo was "Look Beyond Yourself". Jack lived that theme and more. He not only served nobly during his District Governor year, but he served the District on the Rotary International Foundation District committee for many years, as well as District Secretary and Dearborn Club Secretary. Jack and Jane were always the smiling faces you saw when you entered to attend the Rotary meeting. Jack would take your money, and Jane would mark you down for attendance and make sure all guests signed in to the guest register.



Jack loved Rotary, and he had a passion for The Rotary Foundation. He was chair of that committee in the Dearborn club for 20 years or more, always reminding us to commit to Every Rotarian Every Year. Jack for a few years would give us a Foundation minute every month. Ment to make sure we understood the incredible things The Rotary Foundation helps us do.

Jack loved all his Rotary Friends, and was known to vacation with 2 couples from Taylor and Trenton. Euchre was Jack's game of preference, and he would spend all night playing with his friends. PDG Larry Wright informed me they played all week, and Jack would keep a running total of all scores, and present his tabulations at the end of the week. Obviously looking for a payout, and mostly getting one. Larry said he played Euchre with Jack a few weeks ago, and Jack once again beat him. Looks like Jack went out a winner.

We were all winners knowing Jack. There will not be a service for Jack as that was his wish. He was cremated and his ashes will be interred in North Dakota, where Jack was born and raised.

And while Jack did not offer this request, if you felt you would like to honor him and his time with us, I am sure a donation to The Rotary Foundation would be a fitting tribute.

I am truly blessed with having known Jack, for he was a mentor to me in Rotary. He had a wealth of knowledge about Rotary, and a passion for it like no other. You will be sorely missed my friend.

The World Community Service District Matching Grant (WCSDMG) provides clubs in District 6400 with funding for World Community Service Projects, i.e., projects outside Canada and the United States. Funds available for this grant program are raised exclusively from the annual **District Governors Golf Outing**. The Trustees of the Rotary District 6400 Foundation will review all applications and funds will be awarded according to the merit of the project, availability of funds, adherence to grant requirements and other considerations as determined by the Trustees.

The application **deadlines are April 1 and October 1**, although urgent proposals with exceptional need will be considered at any time. All applications are to be **submitted to the District Governor**. Complete all information as requested. Please note that:

- Rotary Clubs with an outstanding final report from a previously awarded WCSDMG are ineligible to apply.
- The grant amount awarded will be no greater than the amount provided by the club.
- Only one application is allowed per club in each competition.
- Typically, less than \$10,000 in total is distributed at each competition.
